This document summarizes requirements and guidance that the Zoar COVID task force thought reasonably applied to the operations of the church. It is not, and is not intended to be, a comprehensive restating of all guidance found in the multiple source documents referenced. Consult the source documents if there is a question about specific wording or accompanying information.

When simultaneous activities occur of different types, consideration of the various requirements and recommendations will need to be assessed across the simultaneous activities and decisions made about how to apply the requirements and recommendations. Favor should be given to the more restrictive requirement or recommendation.

Also please note that the guidance information is constantly being updated. It is the recommendation of the task force that the source documents be checked periodically, and requirements and recommendations updated as needed.

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Terms

- <u>CDC</u>: U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention
- <u>Face Covering</u>: cloth, polypropylene, paper or other covering that covers the nose and mouth and rests snugly above the nose, below the mouth, and on the sides of the face. Coverings that incorporate a valve that is designed to facilitate easy exhalation or mesh masks or other covers with openings, holes,

visible gaps in the design or material, or vents are not appropriate face coverings (even if otherwise appropriate for respiratory protection) because they allow droplets to be released from the covering.

- <u>Face shield</u>: transparent plastic shield that covers the wearer's forehead, extends below the chin, and wraps around the sides of the face. Devices that place a shield in front of only the user's nose and mouth do not meet the definition of a mask, face covering, or face shield. Face shields are normally used as protection for the face and eyes but are a compliant (although not preferred) means of "source control" in relation to COVID-19.

Maximum Occupancy Based on County Risk Level

The Maximum Occupancy Calculation is the total building capacity based on the total building footprint. It does not appear to apply to individual rooms within the building. Individual room occupancy is based on 36 square feet per person. For worship, a single household occupies a table. The Figure below shows 4 seats at a table, but there may less that 4, or 1 or 2 more depending on the household.




Figure 1: Possible Worship Seating

- New fever (generally 100.4° F or more)
- New cough
- Sudden loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat
- Vomiting or diarrhea

Enforcement

- Governor's Executive Order 20-66 Risk and Safety Framework, Paragraph 10
- Possible penalties
 - Per ORS 341A maximum of \$500 per day per violation.
 - o Per ORS 401.990, 30 days in jail or \$1,250 fine or both.

Individuals (recommended)

- Wear mask or face covering (not a face shield) when within 6' of others not living in same household.
- Not required for children under 5 years of age, though strongly recommended for children between 2 and 5.
- Not recommended for children under 2.
- Not required when eating or drinking.
- Individuals with a medical condition that makes it hard to breathe or a disability that prevents the individual from wearing a mask, face covering or face shield can request an accommodation.

- All staff, contractors, visitors, volunteers or other service providers that are in the facility are **required** to wear a face covering.
 - An exception is allowed for providers and staff if they have a medically documented medical condition or disability that prevents them from wearing a face covering.

- Masks are not required for children between 2 to Kindergarten age in the pre-school setting.
- The pre-school cannot require masks for children, nor can they say children cannot wear them. It is up to the parents.
- Require hand-washing after touching a face covering.
- Require face coverings to be washed daily, or a new face covering to be worn daily.
 - o Soiled face coverings should be stored in a safe place inaccessible to others.
 - o Disposable face coverings or face shields are to be worn only once.

- Wash hands frequently (20 seconds with soap and water).
- Wash hands after
 - o Blowing nose, cover coughs and sneezes.
 - Throw any used tissue away immediately.
 - o Before and after touching eyes, nose or mouth.
 - o After using the restroom or assisting with restroom use.
 - o Before and after entering or leaving a public place.
 - o Before and after touching your (or someone else's such as child's) mask.
 - o After changing a diaper.
 - o Before eating or preparing food.
- Hand sanitizer (at least 60% alcohol) may be used if hands are not visibly dirty.
 - o Read and follow manufacturer's directions on label.
 - Keep hand sanitizers away from fire or flame.
 - o Children under 6 should had adult supervision when using hand sanitizer.
 - Store out of reach of children.

- Routine Cleaning
 - Clean visibly dirty surfaces with soap and water prior to disinfection.
 - Practice routine cleaning and disinfection of frequently touched surfaces. More frequent cleaning and disinfection may be required based on level of use.
 - High touch can include things like door handles, table surfaces, the back of a chair for pulling it out, light switches, counter tops, pens.
 - o Disinfect with an approved disinfectant according to use instruction.
 - o Includes hard and soft surfaces (furniture, carpet, drapes), electronics, laundry.
- Post-infection cleaning
 - Close off exposed areas.
 - o Open doors and windows and use fans or other engineering controls to increase air circulation in the area.

 - Wait 24 hours before cleaning.
 - O Clean immediate workspaces of infected person.
 - Vacuum, if needed, with high-efficiency particulate (HEPA) filter bags, only when area is vacant. Temporarily turn off HVAC.
- Use common sense to determine if wearing gloves, gowns, masks when cleaning and when handling trash is appropriate.
- Wash hands often.

- Clean once every 24 hours if occupied less than 12 hours daily.
- Clean once every 8 hours if occupied more than 12 hours daily.
- Exception: In locations with only drop-in availability or minimal staffing (guidance is less than 10), the employer is permitted to rely upon a regular schedule of cleaning and sanitation and directing employees to sanitize their own work surfaces before use.

Insurance

- Insurance companies do not have separate language to cover COVID.
- The church's policy has an exclusion for loss due to virus or bacteria including COVID-19.
- The best risk mitigation plan is for the church and pre-school to follow the government requirements and guidelines and document our efforts to comply.

General (Recommended)

- Drop-off and Pick-up
 - o Drop-off and pick-up outside if possible.
 - Have parents wear face covering.
 - Have parents maintain 6' physical distancing from others.
 - o Have children wash their hands or use hand sanitizer immediately upon entry.
 - Use with adult supervision.
 - Keep out of children's reach.
 - Keep a log of drop-off / pick-up.
- Health Check if any of these are true, the person should not participate and should quarantine for 10 days from date of last contact with the COVID-19 case.
 - o Fever 100.4° F or higher?
 - o Exposed to a person with a positive or presumptive COVID-19 case in the past 14 days.
 - o New loss of taste or smell, unusual cough, shortness of breath, or fever.
